## Adjunct Authors Night

On Tuesday, February 22, the AFA held its first ever author night. With strong attendance and both professional and social conversation, the book length work of six of our members was highlighted.

The event was timed to precede the college's monthly Board of Trustee meeting, allowing administrators and Board members to see a small bit of the professional academic and creative work we do in addition to teaching. The authors were also acknowledged in the Board meeting.

David Arieti presented two

works on geographic and climate science. We were also pleased to welcome his co-author, Jacob Nieva.

Thomas Sanfilip showed three volumes of poetry while Barbara Vallaly's two books showed how family narrative became published histories. History prowess was also shown through Richard Smelter's book on the Colt Army revolver.

Showing our range of expertise, Jackie McNeilly showed her fully-illustrated children's book, How Uncle

Russ Learned to Swim.

Nathan Harpaz, who also curates the art museum on the Des Plaines campus where the event was held, added two of his works on two exhibits.

Look for the Des Plaines Campus library to dedicate a shelf toward the door with the works of these authors and books by more adjuncts.

Space here does not allow the deserved full description of the works these talented writers pre-

This being the first event of its kind the AFA held, we presented only book-length publications. Because of its success, do look to future years when we may be able to repeat with other types of academic, creative and professional works.



## National Anti-Union Concerns

Of course we are all concerned with the events in Madison over the last two weeks. Similar anti-union rhetoric and draft laws can be found in other traditionally pro-worker states also. The state-level union, the IEA does have lobbyists watching our state legislature, and so it may be imperative to read communications from the IEA and NEA, more than ever before.

Also, watch the local news. Unionized Adjuncts seem to be under pressure at Columbia College and East-West university.

A local's newsletter is not the spot to debate politics, but it simply right to call our members to watch events as they unfold, to be careful in interpreting information presented by overheated media, and to act when conscious calls.

## Professional Development Requirements

Again, the AFA

reminds members that professional development is part of our contract. Every five years, we should each receive a letter from the school requesting a report on our professional development activities which is to be submitted to our chairs. If you received one this year, please act on it. We also recommend you discuss what is acceptable professional development with your chair.

## Adjunct Commitment Contracts in Emails

One example of the cooperation between the administration and the AFA is part of our contract. Longer-term adjuncts are given a "Commitment to Teach form" which promises to the school that the instructor will teach for the next year. This allows Oakton to plan ahead more than many colleges. On the instructor's side, this form lays the foundation for some of the seniority and bumping rights the union has fought for. In short, this is an important form.

This form was emailed last week and the instructor must print it out and return it to her or his chair. If you have taught at Oakton for twenty-two Fall and Spring semesters, please check for that form in your email.
